Lifeguards:

- Hold current lifeguard certification, CPR/AED for adults and bloodborne pathogens training.
- Wear clothing while on duty that is marked "lifeguard" or "guard".
- o Equipped with rescue tub and harness and whistle (or other signaling device)

Safety Equipment at waterfront

- o Maintained in good repair in aquatic area.
- o Backboard w/ head immobilizer & sufficient straps attached.
- Ring buoy w/harness OR rescue tube w/50ft of rope attached OR throw bag with 50ft of rope attached {Note: must have 1 of the 3 items}

Personal Flotation Devices (PFD)

- o At least one PDF must be readily available for each individual over 13yrs of age while on board a boat.
- Children 13 years and under must wear a proper fitting, coast guard approve PFD while onboard a boat.
- o Any individual on a sailboard must wear a PFD.
- Boats 16 feet or more in length must have throwable PFD onboard in addition to wearable PFDs.

Supervision:

- One lifeguard per 50 persons and one attendant. 2 lifeguards per 51-100 persons and 1 attendant per 50 persons. (see table 78.26)
- o Staff must have a designated check-in/check-out system.
- Method of supervising swimmers (buddy system, buddy check)
- No swimmer may enter beyond their evaluated ability.

Aquatic Area:

- Posted rules & restrictions for boating and swimming areas. (verbally done when off-site trips)
- Designated separate areas for each aquatic program activity.
- o A swimming test shall be conducted to evaluate swimmer proficiency.
- Maintained clean and free of hazards including: docks, ladders, rafts, diving boards, boats, PFD, paddles.
- Swimming after dark only if adequate lighting to identify swimmers.

Rescue Boat:

- Must be readily available when activities are beyond the swimming area.
- Equipped with the following:
 - A reach pole or standard-length oar/paddle may substitute.
 - Ring buoy w/harness OR rescue tube w/ 50ft of rope attached OR throw bag w/ 50ft of rope attached {Note: must have 1 of the 3 items}
 - PFD devices that are coast guard approved and properly sized for each individual.

❖ Motorboats:

- o If born after Jan 1, 1989, must have one of the following:
 - Hold a valid boating license/certificate.
 - Accompanied by individual 18yr and older that holds a valid boating license/certificate.
