Human Development & Relationships

Hannah Zellmer, Human Development and Relationships Educator

An evidence based series of programs designed to promote positive parenting and reduce challenges across childhood and adolescence. These classes provide parents with a toolbox of strategies to raise confident and healthy children, build strong family relationships and manage misbehavior.



Class Series Offered

- Triple P: 0-12

Fear-Less

This new program is intended to support parents and caregivers that have children with moderate to high levels of anxiety that causes significant distress or impacts their everyday functioning. This program aims to help parents develop strategies and skills to be able to appropriately respond to their child's anxiety and develop emotional resilience.

Hannah completed 3-day training in August in Triple P Fear-Less and was able to participate in this training accreditation thanks to a Triple P Expansion grant through First Five Fox Valley and partnership with Children's WI. The cost of the training and participant materials were completely covered by this grant.

Families have shared positive feedback through post session evaluations. When asked, "What did you find most valuable about this class?, one parent shared "the good and bad and the when of how to respond to anxiety. the fear ladder. constructive problem solving. discussing avoidance." Another parent shared, "Tools to help my child be able to manage their anxiety."



Supporting Early Childcare Educators

Provide training for childcare providers as a Wisconsin Registry Certified Trainer. These classes count towards their required continuing education hours.

Marquette County Child Care Team received \$2500 in ARPA Funds to support Early Childcare Educators taking basic courses to work in childcare. Worked with this team to develop an application process.

Partnership with Marquette County Early Learning Center (Head start) to provide parenting classes and resources.

Worked to analyze data from multi-county focus groups for Early Child Care educators. This was a statewide assessment aiming to improve continuing education for early childhood educators continuing education, using data to be strategic and intentional to best meet the needs of teachers, children and families. Six Marquette County Educators/Administrators participated in one of the focus groups.

Co-Parenting Education

Co-parenting education supports children and their families during times of unexpected transitions. Hannah works with the Marquette County family court to provide Parents ForeverTM, a 4-hour co-parenting class for parents facing separation or divorce and for families experiencing changes in the custody of their children. The quality of parenting and the handling of parental conflict are key drivers of children's well-being during this time. Classes teach valuable skills for reducing parental conflict, improving communication, and supporting children during periods of uncertainty. In 2024, Hannah held 7 classes with 50 participants.

Parent Cafés

Parent Cafes support build strong families using The Five Protective Factors. Hannah partnered with Childcaring to host 8 Parent Cafes with a total attendance of 138.

To support an emerging need, language interpretation services were utilized during in person Parent Cafes. This supported Spanish speaking families of Marquette County to participate in these classes alongside English speaking families.

40 parent education workshops were offered both in-person and virtually to support building knowledge and skills about child development, early literacy, emotion coaching, positive parenting, and coping with parental stress.

97% of co-parenting class participants learned new strategies to keep children out of the middle of parenting issues so they can communicate effectively and handle conflict.

involves youth in project-based education. Through project learning, youth can explore their interests (SPARKS) and master new skills. 4-H projects are meant to be hands-on to create long-term learning experiences. This hands-on process allows youth to understand not only how to do something but also why they are doing it. Research shows that youth spending time in long-term positive youth programs, such as 4-H, are less likely to become involved in high-risk behaviors, have higher school attendance and grades, better conflict management practices, and better work habits. The goal is to eliminate barriers so more young people will experience the benefits of 4-H!







Teen Court

The mission of the Marquette County Teen Court is to join together as a council of professional and community members to find ways to enhance positive youth and family development. The Teen Court serves to modify behavior of youth with violations by combining positive peer pressure and involvement within our county, families, schools, and organizations to promote youth development and restorative practices. Teen Court offers eligible youth an alternative to suspension or to appearing in juvenile court. In 2024 Marquette County teen court members volunteered more than 320 hours in positive youth development.

Achieving More **Together**

UW-Madison Division of Extension works alongside the people of Wisconsin throughout urban and rural communities to deliver practical educational programs where people live and work. In Marquette County, FoodWIse partners with Montello Schools, Oxford Elementary, Coloma Elementary, Oxford Head Start, Strong Bodies and the Care and Share Food Bank to help make the healthy choice the easy choice in our communities.

Community

Impacts in 2024

Engaged with 116 learners around nutrition education topics in a variety of settings, including early care and education centers, K-12 school settings, food pantries.

Partnered with Montello Schools to expand the Harvest of the Month campaign, reaching students, parents & caregivers with messages in English & Spanish to promote eating Wisconsin-grown fruits & vegetables.

With this programming I held 52 total sessions totaling 34 hours of direct education. I taught MyPlate for the youth classes, sampling recipes and learning healthy cooking options. I taught Strong Bodies to the adults, learning a strength and balance fitness routine with adult nutrition education included.

Inspiring

Collaborations

- Worked with Montello School with the Farm to School Grant and Harvest of the Month.
- We were able to highlight locally grown food and feature it in the cafeteria for the students to enjoy.
- There were also 8 community events where family and community organizations were invited into the school to help promote Farm to School efforts.
- Some examples are, The Wisconsin Chili Lunch, The Great Apple Crunch, a Potato Tasting Event.







It was great to work with the school, community and local farmers to bring these programs to the children in our community.

Multi-level Program **Efforts**

I was able to provide programming at Oxford, Coloma and Montello Elementary Schools. I also partnered with Oxford Head Start for parent/child cooking classes.

I was able to provide a booth at the Montello Schools Rural Safety days. Here students picked a "germ" picture from my display and answered a question about food safety.

I also held the first Strong Bodies
Senior Fitness class in Montello. This
class had 10 participants that were
able to work on strength and balance.
This class can be modified for all
fitness and age levels. Here is a
comment from a participant, "My jeans
are looser, I feel stronger in shoulder
and legs. I no longer have to sit down
to put underwear and pants on, more
balanced. I walk better with my dog."

Research

One of the most interesting aspects of my role is conducting on-farm research projects. These projects are farmer-driven and the goal is to answer a question that they have. In 2024 I had five on-farm projects.

Three (two in corn and one in potato) related to reducing nitrogen losses from fields. Another was on growing alternative forages, specifically warm-season grasses, on sandy soils to look at their yield and field value (photo at left). The last one was on tracking on farm soybean production systems to better understand which practices relate to increased profitability. I held multiple field days to showcase these projects.

Meetings and Field Days

February: Weed Management Meeting with Dr. Rodrigo Werle – Producers and agronomists found this valuable for better understanding their options for managing weeds, especially those that have developed herbicide resistance. I spoke about herbicide rotational restrictions and how to plan for a rotation.

March: Annual Processing Crops Meeting (Central Sands) and New Processing Crops

Meeting (Green Lake) of benefit to our vegetable industry farmers and professionals.

May: Potato Scouting Training with Dr. Russell Groves and Dr. Amanda Gevens.

Summer: Hancock Highlight Series — three events highlighting nutrient leaching, disease management, warm-season grasses, and developments in nitrogen fixation in corn. Involved great discussions in the field to look at cutting edge research happening at the research station in our area.

Trainings & Statewide Efforts In my role, I assist local farmers in keeping their nutrient management plans and pesticide applicator licenses current.

I've conducted well-attended trainings on these topics across several counties, averaging about 20 participants each.

Additionally, I co-authored the Wisconsin Ag Climate Outlook, a seasonal report detailing weather impacts on agriculture, which is distributed to subscribers and featured in state newsletters.

I also participated in planning the Wisconsin Weed Management Workshop and the Badger Crop Update Meetings, both of which attracted many attendees and showcased the latest in crop management research.



In 2024, the Extension team continued to embody the Wisconsin Idea as they worked to extend university knowledge to every part of our county. We administered programming through four of the six Institutes making up the UW-Madison Division of Extension: Positive Youth Development (including 4-H); Agriculture; Health & Well-Being--FoodWIse; and Human Development & Relationships. Through their efforts, the Extension team was able to support positive youth development; support Wisconsin's agriculture industry; empower health and well-being; promote healthy relationships; foster civic and economic leadership; and enhance resilient natural resource systems. In addition, our Extension team was also part of a statewide network which delivered services to communities across Wisconsin. It was this network that allowed our team to bring added resources to Marquette County in the form of program area specialists, UW specialists, and staff from other counties who specialize in an area different from what our team members do. Finally, the cooperative nature of the co-funded partnership between Marquette County and the UW-Madison Division of Extension allowed for and supported all of the educational programming provided.


