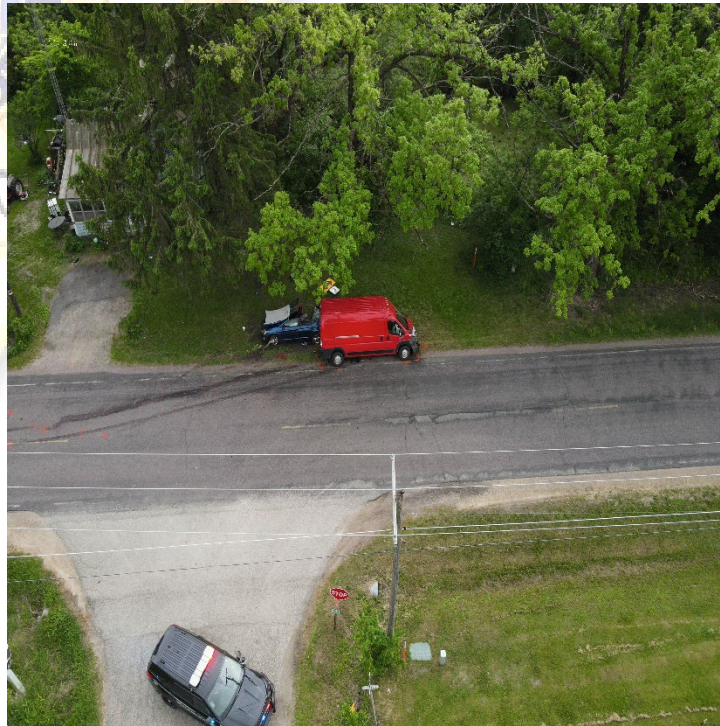
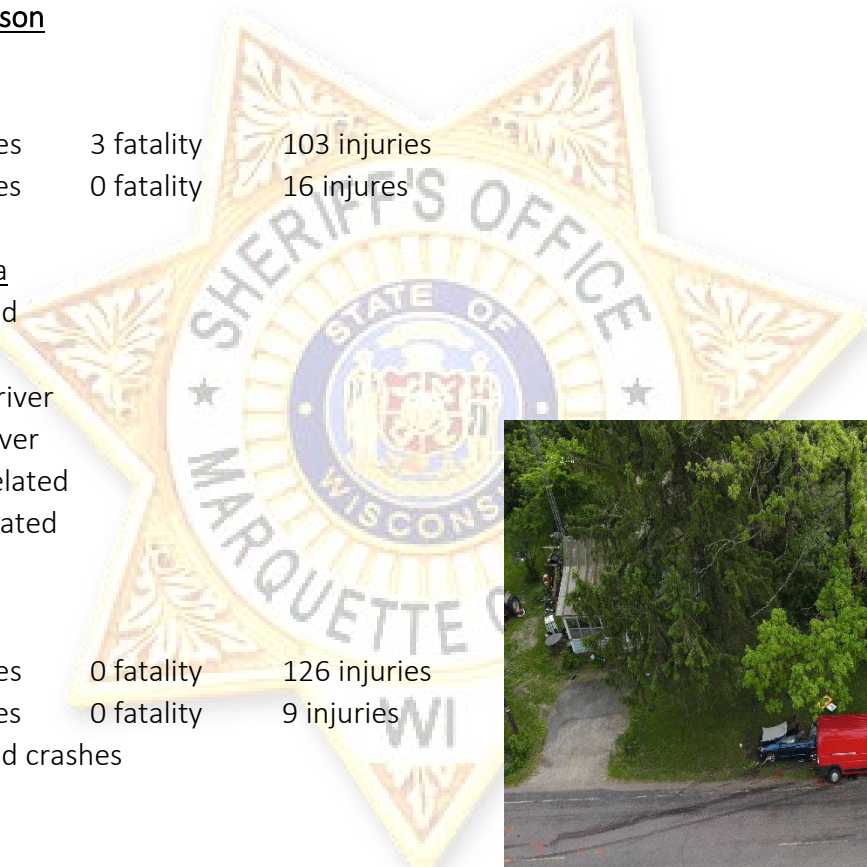

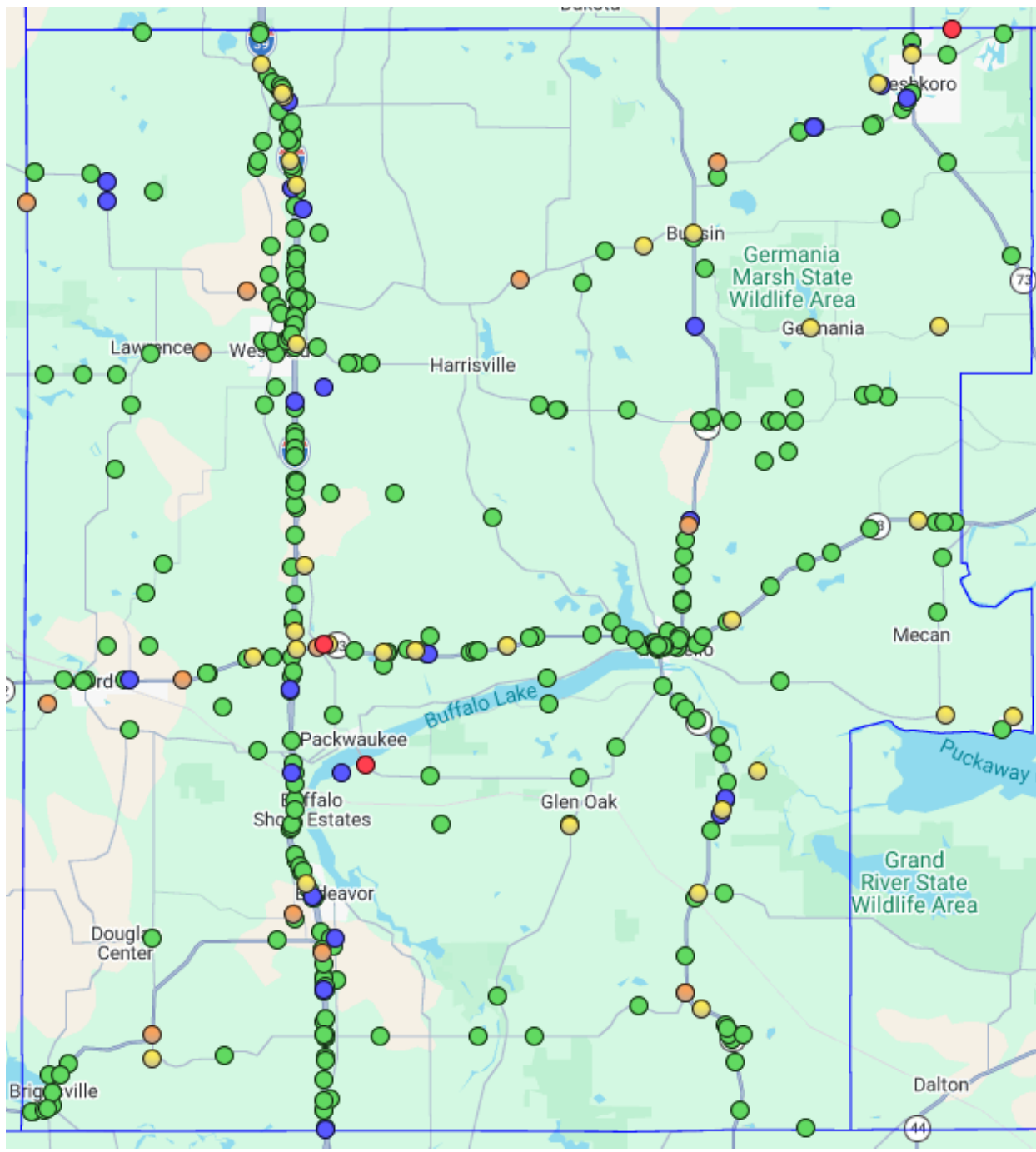

## **Marquette County Sheriff's Office Detective Sergeants Division 2025 Year End Summary**

The Detective Sergeant Division of the Marquette County Sheriff's Office is comprised of Detective Sergeant Brian Ropicky, Detective Sergeant Cameron Klump, and Detective Sergeant Emma Kuklinski.

In 2025, the division investigated a total of 115 cases spanning a broad range of serious and complex criminal matters. These investigations included burglary, multiple theft and contractor theft cases, 11 fraud investigations, two missing or endangered person cases, child pornography offenses, 12 death investigations (including two involving children), 16 sexual assault investigations involving both children and adults, four structure fires, and vehicle fire investigations.

Approximately ten of these cases originated from referrals by Marquette County Human Services and involved allegations of sexual abuse, physical abuse, and children exposed to dangerous drug environments.

Throughout the year, Detective Sergeants prepared and executed numerous legal process documents in support of these investigations, including:

- 2- residential search warrants
- 3- cellular phone search warrants
- 5- DNA search warrants
- 2- vehicle search warrants
- 1- Vehicle Emergency Data Recorder (EDR)/infotainment system search warrant
- 7- search warrants for records
- 22- subpoenas (Bank records or subscriber information)
- 1- Act 79 probation search related to a drug investigation

As part of maintaining a Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA) compliant jail, the Detective Sergeants are certified PREA investigators. Detective Sergeant Cameron Klump serves as the agency's primary PREA investigator. In 2025, the division did not investigate any PREA-related complaints within the Marquette County Jail.

### **Digital Forensic Capabilities – Cellebrite**

In 2018, the Sheriff's Office acquired the Cellebrite digital forensic system to conduct in-house forensic examinations of cellular phones, GPS devices, and digital storage media. Since its acquisition, this system has been used hundreds of times to extract and analyze digital evidence in criminal investigations. In 2025 alone, Cellebrite was utilized more than 25 times for cellular device examinations.

Cellebrite allows detectives to efficiently organize and analyze large volumes of data returned through search warrants for social media platforms such as Snapchat and Facebook. These warrant returns frequently consist of hundreds of pages and extensive photo and video evidence. The system significantly reduces the time required to organize and review digital evidence, allowing detectives to focus their time on analysis and investigative follow-up.

Prior to the purchase of this system, all digital devices had to be transported to outside agencies for examination, which delayed investigations. Currently, detectives are able to conduct device examinations while suspects or victims are present for interviews, allowing digital evidence to be used in real time during questioning. As the digital connection to crime continues to expand, this capability has proven essential to conducting timely, thorough, and efficient investigations.

### **Online Investigative Resources**

The Detective Division utilizes several advanced investigative databases and analytical tools to support theft, fraud, and identification investigations.

LeadsOnline is the nation's largest internet-based investigative service and allows personnel to track transactions from thousands of reporting businesses, including pawn shops and scrap yards. Detectives can proactively search for stolen items and receive notifications when previously reported property is sold or pawned through participating businesses.

RISSProp, accessed through the Mid-States Organized Crime Information Center (MOCIC), is an expanding online reporting system used by businesses nationwide. Notably, all ECO-ATMs report transactions to RISSProp, assisting detectives and deputies in locating stolen cellular phones and electronics. As additional Wisconsin businesses are added to this system, its value as an investigative tool continues to grow.

LexisNexis Accurint is a subscription-based public records and analytics platform used extensively by the division. Detectives rely on Accurint to identify current and past addresses, phone numbers, associates, businesses, email addresses, and familial connections for both suspects and victims. This resource routinely assists in linking phone numbers, email addresses, and physical addresses to individuals during both active and delayed investigations.

### **Analytical and Multimedia Support – MOCIC**

The Detective Division also partners with the Mid-States Organized Crime Information Center (MOCIC) for advanced analytical support. MOCIC provides access to numerous specialized databases and analytical tools not otherwise available at the agency level. Detectives utilize MOCIC for photo and video enhancement, analytical research, and facial recognition in cases involving unidentified suspects. In 2025, facial recognition assistance through MOCIC proved successful in multiple investigations.

The continued use of these investigative tools, combined with the experience and training of the Detective Sergeant Division, ensures that Marquette County residents receive thorough, timely, and professional criminal investigations across an increasingly complex investigative landscape.

## **Significant Investigations — 2025**

### **Sexual Assault Investigation — Village of Westfield**

In February 2025, patrol deputies and detectives responded to a report of a sexual assault in the Village of Westfield after a victim ran unclothed into a local business seeking help. The victim reported that two days earlier she had met a male on the Tinder dating application and agreed to meet him at Pioneer Memorial Park to talk and potentially engage in consensual sexual activity.

Upon arrival at the park, the victim was approached by a Black male who stated he was there to meet her. As she attempted to close her vehicle door, the suspect prevented it from closing, produced a firearm, pointed it at her, and ordered her to remove her clothing and move into the back seat. Over the course of approximately one hour, the suspect sexually assaulted the victim while maintaining control of the firearm.

The victim recalled the suspect stating he drove a Kia vehicle and resided in Madison, indicating Westfield was a midway meeting point. Detectives reviewed data from the Flock license plate reader in Westfield and identified only two Kia vehicles passing the camera within a three-hour window—one belonging to the victim and the other registered to a Black male with a Madison, Wisconsin address.

With assistance from a sketch artist from the Wisconsin Department of Justice–Division of Criminal Investigation, a composite sketch was created based on the victim’s description. Detectives compared this image to body-worn camera footage obtained from other law enforcement contacts involving the registered Kia owner and observed a near-identical match.

Security footage from nearby businesses showed the suspect arriving shortly after the victim, parking near the Pioneer Motor Inn, and walking toward the park dressed entirely in black. After the assault, the suspect was seen returning to his vehicle and leaving the area shortly after the victim unknowingly drove past him.

With assistance from the Madison Police Department Street Crimes Unit, detectives confirmed the suspect’s residence and vehicle location. During an interview, the suspect initially denied traveling to Westfield but later admitted he had. He acknowledged having sexual intercourse with the victim but claimed it was consensual.

Detectives subsequently executed search warrants for the suspect’s residence, vehicle, cellular phone, and for his DNA. A firearm was recovered from the glove compartment of the suspect’s vehicle.

The suspect was arrested by the Madison Police Department and transported to the Sheriff’s Office by a Marquette County Deputy. The suspect pled guilty in 2026 and is currently awaiting sentencing.

This investigation highlighted the critical value of Flock license plate reader technology. Without this resource, investigative leads would likely have been exhausted, as the suspect’s DNA was not on file. The case may not have been solved without this technology.

## **Child Death Investigation — Town of Crystal Lake**

In May 2025, deputies responded to a residence in the Town of Crystal Lake for a report of an unresponsive three-year-old female while CPR was in progress. Upon arrival, deputies observed a significant amount of blood around the victim's head. While assisting with lifesaving efforts, deputies learned the child may have suffered a gunshot wound. Despite continued efforts, the child was pronounced deceased.

Through investigation, detectives learned that the victim's seven-year-old brother had accessed a loaded handgun that had been stored on top of a refrigerator. The firearm belonged to the children's grandfather, the property owner. The juvenile male reported that he had been handling the firearm, pointed it at the victim, and pulled the trigger. After the discharge, he returned the firearm to the top of the refrigerator and informed his mother that the victim had fallen.

The juvenile's account was consistent with the physical evidence observed at the scene. This case was forwarded to the District Attorney's Office for review and charging consideration and remains under review.

## **Death Investigation — Town of Packwaukee**

In June 2026, detectives conducted a death investigation in the Town of Packwaukee after deputies were dispatched to a report of a body located behind a vehicle in a residential driveway. Upon arrival, deputies located an obviously deceased adult male.

During an interview, the suspect stated he had been driving home from work in the early morning hours during rainfall on County Highway D near Lakeview Drive. He reported observing what he believed to be a dead animal in the roadway, striking the object, and continuing to drive. The suspect stated he could hear something dragging beneath the vehicle but did not stop until he arrived home. After checking the front tires, he went inside the residence.

Search warrants were executed for the suspect's residence and vehicle. Detectives were assisted by the Wisconsin State Crime Laboratory Crime Scene Response Team in processing the vehicle for evidence.

Forensic scene mapping assistance was provided by the Wisconsin State Patrol Traffic Reconstruction Unit. Measurements and roadway evidence indicated the victim had been dragged for nearly one mile. The Marquette County Drone Team was utilized to document the extensive scene.

This case was referred to the Marquette County District Attorney's Office and is currently being prosecuted.

## **Crash Investigation and Forensic Scene Mapping**

Detective Sergeant Klump oversees the Sheriff's Office Crash Team; a specialized unit trained in advanced vehicle crash investigation through the Wisconsin State Patrol. The team utilizes a range of advanced tools and technology—including total stations, drone systems, and CAD-

based reconstruction software—to produce accurate, court-ready scene documentation and analysis.

The Crash Team plays a critical role in ensuring thorough, precise investigations that support both public safety efforts and the judicial process.

### **Officer Involved Critical Incident Investigation Team**

Marquette County Detectives are active members of a multi-agency investigative team dedicated to responding to and investigating Officer-Involved Critical Incidents. This collaboration ensures compliance with Wisconsin Statute 175.47 (2013 Wisconsin Act 348), which mandates independent investigations of such incidents.

The team is comprised of investigators from 7 Counties, fostering a coordinated and impartial approach to critical incident investigations across the region.

To maintain a high standard of professionalism and investigative integrity, participating detectives completed specialized training led by investigators from the Wisconsin Department of Justice, Division of Criminal Investigation. This training enhances the team's ability to effectively manage complex and sensitive cases.

### **Drug Enforcement Activity**

The Marquette County Sheriff's Office remains an active participant in the Central Wisconsin Drug Task Force, a collaborative enforcement group comprised of 15 law enforcement agencies representing eight counties in Central Wisconsin.

In 2025, the Sheriff's Office referred approximately 70 drug-related charges to the Marquette County District Attorney's Office resulting from arrests and investigations. These cases most commonly involved marijuana, cocaine, methamphetamine, heroin, MDMA (ecstasy), and illegally possessed prescription medications.

During 2025, Marquette County experienced two confirmed fentanyl-related overdose deaths. Fentanyl continues to present a significant and growing threat nationwide, and Marquette County is not immune to the impact of this highly potent synthetic opioid. The majority of overdose deaths, both nationally and locally, involve polysubstance use in which fentanyl is present.

Current trends indicate fentanyl is being sold in pure form and is also frequently found mixed into heroin, methamphetamine, and MDMA. Most commonly, fentanyl is encountered as the primary substance in materials believed by users to be heroin. Additionally, fentanyl is being incorporated into pressed counterfeit pills designed to resemble legitimate prescription pain medications, such as Percocet.

These counterfeit pills are not produced in regulated pharmaceutical environments but rather in clandestine settings, often resulting in inconsistent and unpredictable fentanyl concentrations. As a result, one pill may contain little to no fentanyl, while another from the same batch may contain a lethal dose. These are commonly referred to as “hot batches” due to the high risk of fatal overdose. The visual appearance of these counterfeit pills is often convincing enough that most individuals would be unable to distinguish them from authentic pharmaceutical products.

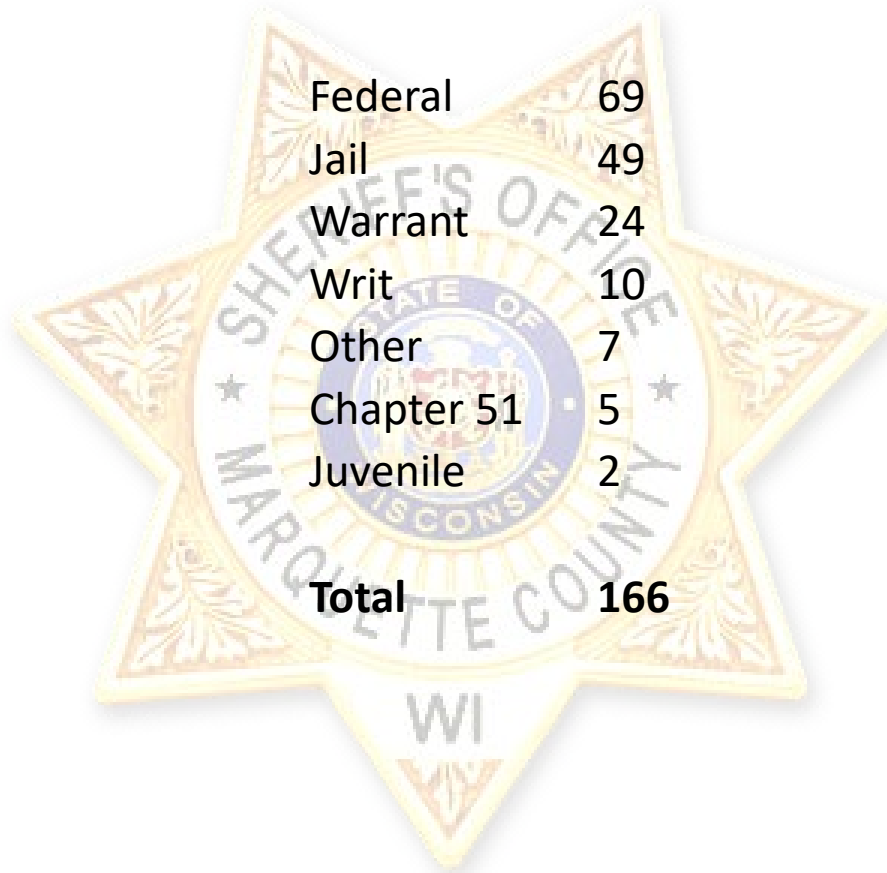

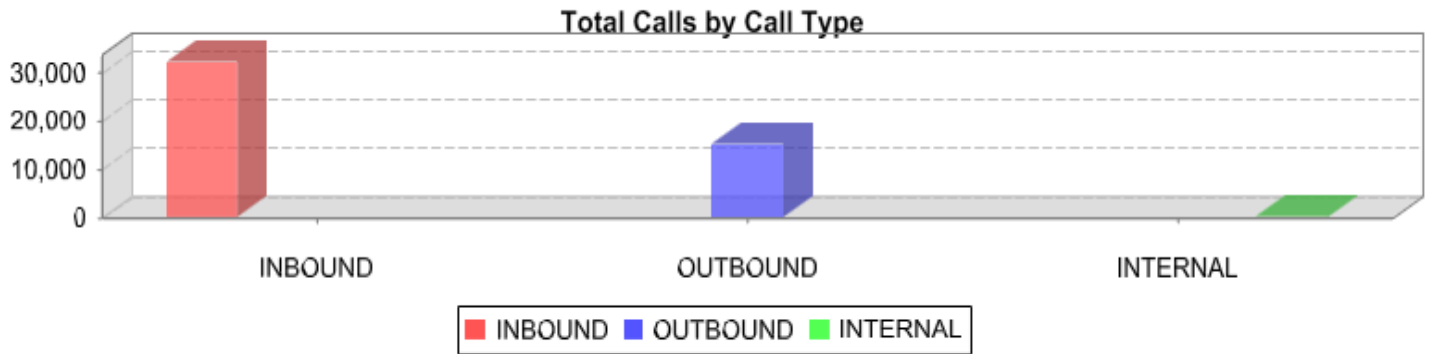

# 2025 Annual Fleet Operations

The Marquette County Sheriff's Office maintains 27 vehicles, which consists of 14 marked patrol vehicles, 1 unmarked patrol vehicles, 1 marked transport vehicle, 1 unmarked transport van, 1 unmarked school vehicle, 3 unmarked detective vehicles, 5 unmarked command staff vehicles, a Kawasaki Mule UTV, and an ambulance. The UTV is used for search and rescue operations, and the ambulance is used for drone team operations.

Our fleet consists of Ford Explorer's, Dodge Durango's, Chevy Tahoe's, Ford 150's, and a Ram 1500.

### Enterprise Fleet Management Program (EFMP)

We partnered with EFMP in July 2025. The lease program started with EFMP buying back 4 of our 2025 squads and 1 of our 2023 squads to lease back to our office. In 2025, our office leased a total of 3 new squads for our fleet.

Between July and December 2025, we had a total of 8 vehicles under lease.

### Fuel Usage

Deputies used 36,133 gallons of fuel in 2025. Compared to 36,750 gallons used in 2024 and 35,246 gallons used in 2023.

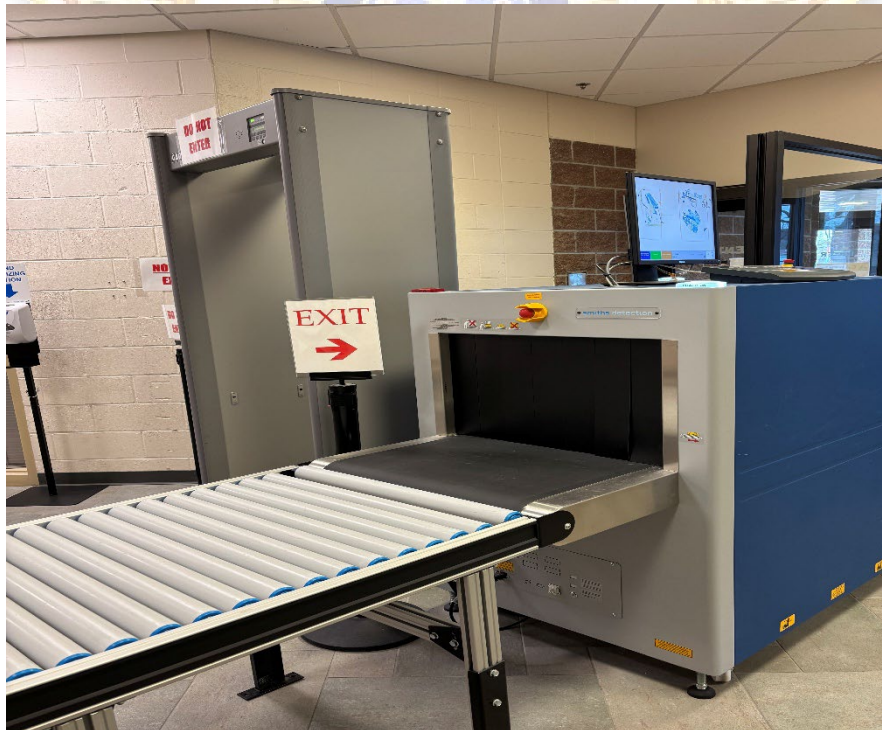

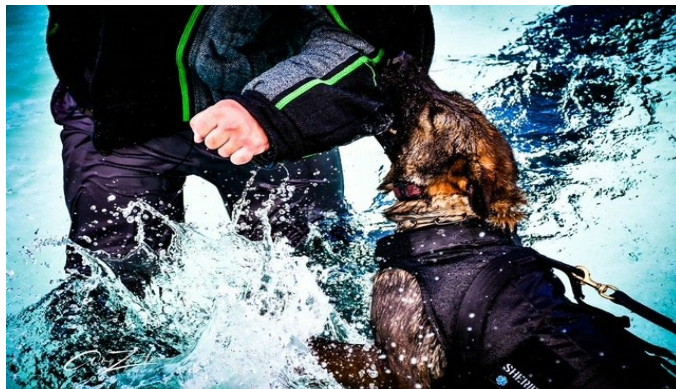


### K9 Program

Sgt Brian Noll and K9 Josch were paired together in the spring of 2024.

The K9 team had 61 total deployments in 2025. K9 Josch assisted with 36 drug sniffs with 24 arrests.

The team was used 8 times looking for evidence, tracking a person, high risk felony stops, or conducting a building or area search.
